#### **Best Practices I**

#### 1. Title of the Practice: Rally

Rally plays an important part of our college. It is one of the best practices. Celebration and observance of birth and death anniversaries are followed by rally to promote and impart its importance to society.

#### **2. Goals:** The goals of this practice are:

- 1. To impart and promote the importance of social harmony among teachers, students and the society at large.
- 2. To promote social integration and unity among the students, teachers and the society so as to prevail peace in the country.
- 3. To promote the ideals and principles of great leaders and inculcating the same to students and teachers and the society.

4. Creating motivation and inspirations among the students and inspiring them to know the ideals of great leaders.

#### 3. The Practice

It is the need of the hour to organise rallies to impart information among students to make them aware of the importance of social integration and to inculcate in them the values of patriotism. Keeping this in view every year, our college held rallies celebrating and observing birth and death anniversaries to promote the ideals and principles of our great leaders. The rally is conducted by the concerned teachers of the college. It commences early in the morning with students carrying banners and shouting slogans. Police protection is provided to the students. After covering a long distance, the students return to the college fully exhausted and refreshment is provided to the students.

#### Rallies are conducted on:

- 1. 2<sup>nd</sup> October, the birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi.
- 2. 20th August, Sadbhavna Divas, the birth anniversary of Rajiv Gandhi.
- 3. 6<sup>th</sup> December, Mahaparinirvan divas, the death anniversary of Babasaheb Ambedkar.

Students actively participate and extend their whole-hearted support and cooperation and maintain discipline. Students shout slogans and carry banners with them. A student disguised as Mahatma Gandhi becomes the focus of attention. On Sadbhavna divas the students visit different religious places like the Temple, Mosque, Church and the statue of Babasaheb Ambedkar. All the students and teachers take an oath to promote unity among different religious groups. On 6<sup>th</sup> December on the occasion of Mahaparinirvan Divas around 5000 College and school students participated in inter school and inter college rally shouting slogans and performing street plays thus making it informative.

#### 4. Evidence of Success:

Rallies have an impact on the thought process of the students. They come back to the college having the experience and knowledge of the great personalities. The evidence of success is seen on their face as they look enlightened and informed. The students look happy and satisfied when provided with some refreshment after their arrival in the college campus. Feedback is taken orally from them. Thus this initiative of the IQAC looks successful.

Strength:

Since the inception of the college, we are striving for excellence in the field of teaching and learning. Years of concerted efforts of the college has resulted in the qualitative and quantitative progress of our institution. The college has been organising, disseminating and upgrading knowledge on various key issues. Since 1995, the college has made its endeavour to prove its academic excellence, social commitment through extension activities and cultural interest with a clear vision for its future growth.

Thus, the college has a mission **Sarvangin Vikasaya Shikshanam** that is all round development of the students through curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The college aims to inculcate honesty, integrity and civilized behaviour among the students so that

they can step in society as shining examples. College is optimistic to march ahead with positive thinking and inculcating traditional as well as recent values of life through education.

Although the college is centrally situated and there are five to six full-fledged colleges already available in the city still a similar and sufficient number of students are enrolled as compared to other colleges. Most of the students enrolled are from backward classes. This is an encouraging strength of our college. A number of students are increasing because the teachers are well trained and College is situated in a place where the communication facilities of rail and road are easily accessible.

#### Weakness:

As far as the weakness is concerned, the college lack basic infrastructure required for the smooth functioning. There is acute shortage of large classrooms and further there is lack of spacious reading rooms, recreation room and sports equipments. No infrastructure grant was proposed to the UGC and utilized by the college until now. College is running from the past twenty one years on a rent basis rented from the Municipality. Therefore, there is shortage of playground and canteen. For this purpose a contract has been done with Coronation Club for playground and a nearby canteen just in front of the college has been arranged for the convenience of the students.

#### **Opportunities:**

Inspite of the weakness mentioned above, the result of the student is quite satisfactory. The students get opportunity to engage themselves in co-curricular activities and are doing well similar to other colleges of Bhusawal. After passing the final examination, most of the students are absorbed in central and state government services. Many students are also selected for private section services. A good number of students who complete their undergraduate course are engaged in business sector. Some students are involved in social and community development works.

The students of our College are highly motivated in the social, economic, cultural, moral and spiritual issues of the society and the humanity as a whole. Bhusawal is very close to Jalgaon which an industrial city and the students get an opportunity to work after they complete their graduation.

#### **Challenges:**

The major challenge is the existence of four to five full-fledged colleges in Bhusawal where they provide good infrastructure facility to the students. The creamy students opt for these colleges and the rest enrol themselves in Bhole College. Being located at a semi-urban area, the economic condition of the people is not so sound to provide higher education to their children. Another challenge to the institution is that the majority of the students having strong economic condition migrate to other states for pursuing their higher education.

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
